I am writing as the current Chair of the State Bar of Michigan, Committee on the United States Courts ("U.S. Courts Committee"), to convey the Committee's comments on the proposed style amendments to the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. The U.S. Courts Committee is a standing committee of the State Bar of Michigan composed of practitioners and judges from both the Eastern and Western Districts of Michigan.
